SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

We have 7 scholarships this year! Two full tuition scholarships, 4 for \$500 each and 1 for \$350 are available for the Full-Stay Option (Sunday July 26–Saturday August 1)

The 7 scholarships will be available as follows:

- 2 full ride \$750 scholarships for alumni *who have never been to a Goddard/Warren Wilson MFA alumni conference before*
- 1 restricted: \$500 "Linda Dyer Memorial Scholarship" for a poet
- 1 \$500 "Distance Scholarship" for anyone traveling at least 1500 miles to get to Portland
- 1 \$500 for a recent graduate of the program
- 1 \$500 unrestricted scholarship
- 1 \$350 unrestricted scholarship

Please don't hesitate to apply if you *require* financial assistance to get you to this year's conference. Please do NOT apply if you do not have need. Please do NOT apply if you are uncertain about being able to attend. Having unclaimed scholarship awards causes headaches, sometimes madness, for conference coordinators. Send your name, year of graduation, your address, whether or not you've ever been to a conference before, and whether you graduated in Poetry or Fiction (the Linda Dyer Memorial Scholarship is available to Poetry Grads only). Names will be drawn from a hat or a bucket. **If, however, you have received a scholarship in the last three years, please give someone else the chance to benefit.*

2015 ALUMNI CONFERENCE INFORMATION

We are pleased to announce that the 2015 Alumni Conference will be held for the very first time ever at Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon from Sunday, July 26 to Saturday, August 1.

Following are our options and prices:

FULL STAY: \$750. Sunday, July 26 to Saturday, August 1. Single room, all meals, facilities, events.

SHORT STAY: \$525. Wednesday, July 29 to Saturday, August 1. Ditto.

COMMUTERS: \$475. Includes the reception (and DANCE!), facilities, lunches and dinners, as well, of course, of all classes, lectures, etc.

EARLY ARRIVAL: \$40. For those who need, you can arrange to arrive Saturday, July 25 and stay in the dorm (no dinner included). (If anyone needs to stay an additional evening, on Saturday, August 1, please contact Michael Jarmer for further information regarding on-site hotel rooms for the evening.)

The first meal will be dinner, July 26, and the final will be breakfast, August 1.

The **SHORT-STAY CONFERENCE** is the perfect option for alumni with limited time availability. Activities include:

- Classes and lectures. Alumni design their own classes and lectures. So put on your thinking cap and consider this: what was the class you always wanted to take? What was the lecture you always wanted to hear? Perhaps you'll be the one to deliver it...
- **Panels and caucuses.** The alumni community has some of the smartest folks

around—and in panels and caucuses, a subset of the group or the whole community can come together to discuss specific craft topics or issues of interest to alums.

- **Readings.** Every evening, we meet to hear new work from alums.
- Annual alumni meeting. Help us chart our direction for the next year as we look for new ways to connect with each other, support Friends of Writers, and serve each other and the Warren Wilson community.
- The Dance! HEY, WHO CAN FORGET THE DANCE?

The **FULL-STAY CONFERENCE** is a full week, and what an amazing week it is. In addition to everything we offer during the Short-Stay Conference, you'll get the following:

- **Workshops.** Fiction, poetry, and mixed workshops can help you steer your work from good to great. With an emphasis on supporting the writer's intention, alumni provide the feedback that many people have been missing since they left the program. (Note: Short-stay participants organize their own workshops. The conference will set up a workshop for full-stay participants who choose that option.)
- **Poetry manuscript review** / **fiction roundtable.** These are designed to look at longer manuscripts or collections, be they works in progress or nearing completion. You'll be in touch with your group and share your work with one another by late May. Please remember that manuscript review and fiction roundtable require serious commitments and generous feedback on longer works.
- **Opening night reception.** Rekindle old friendships and kickstart new ones as we gear up for a week together on one of the most beautiful campuses in the country.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION DEADLINES:

NOTE: We will once again be offering online Registration and Payment options; however, online payment will entail a single payment in full. If you wish to register with an initial deposit and pay the balance at the registration deadline, please snail-mail your registration, deposit check, and two SASEs to Michael Jarmer.

- May 2: Final day to register with deposit. All registrations after this must pay in full at time of registration. Deposit of \$250 + two SASEs.
- May 30: Registration closes and payment in full or balances due:

Full Stay: \$750 (full payment), \$500 (balance due after deposit) Short Stay: \$525 (full payment), \$275 (balance due after deposit)

Commuters: \$475 (full payment), \$225 (balance due after deposit) Early Arrival (July 25): \$40

- June 13: Full payment or balance due plus \$100 late fee accepted by credit card only.
- JUNE 15: May deposit fee forfeited if balance unpaid by June 13.

THESE ARE THE OPTIONS AND THESE ARE THE DEADLINES. SORRY, BUT LONGSTANDING POLICY DOES NOT ALLOW FOR SPECIAL REQUESTS.

We will have classes, panel discussions, and caucuses. Please begin to think about teaching or leading one yourself; what was that class you always wanted to take? Who's that writer you've always wanted to tell people about? Here's your chance! Or just attend and carve out a space to get lots of writing done! At any rate, you'll be surrounded by the knowledge, insight, welcome, and infectious enthusiasm for which this group, all the way back to its inception at Goddard, is so absolutely famous. If you choose to teach a class or lead a caucus, please bear in mind the level of your students and prepare your class accordingly.

There will be workshops – fiction, poetry, and mixed as interest dictates. Likewise, for fullstayers, a Manuscript Review for poets and Fiction Roundtable for fiction writers. These are designed to look at longer manuscripts or collections, be they works in progress or nearing completion. You'll be in touch with your group and share your work with one another by mid-May. **Please remember that the Review and Roundtable require serious commitments.** There has also been some interest voiced in non-fiction manuscripts on occasion; if that is what you're working on please let Michael know.

There will be readings every evening. Please plan to give a ten minute reading, but understand that if you do read, **your are committing to attend all readings**. These are the real treasures of the conferences, and you can't find a better, more focused and supportive audience anywhere. Again, **please** plan to read, but not interested in a workshop? Don't know about classes? No problem. Sleep, write, sun, swim, bird watch, go on a pilgrimage to Powell's Books. You will be asked to volunteer for a community service slot (sit with keys, reading intros, dance set-up, silent auction help, etc.), and we'd like everyone to attend our annual Alumni Meeting, but otherwise the time is yours.

Finally, we hope to have a silent auction to raise funds for FOW. Think about artwork you might bring or send, craftwork, jewelry, books, 20th Century Art Deco purses, etc.

Those of you who have never attended a conference before have probably already heard it: Come! You'll be welcomed! Well, it's true, because you already belong here. Lots of recent grads came last year; reach out to someone you know who attended to check it out. Maybe even hook up with a buddy or two...
